GETTING TO KNOW US, (an exploration of who we are)

DAVID ZIEGENHAGEN – (interviewed by Lew Dick)

David was born and raised in Minneapolis, Minnesota, where he attended elementary and high school and graduated from the University of Minnesota with a degree in Journalism.

When the Peace Corps began in 1961, he was one of the first Volunteers and was assigned to an education program in the Philippines. After completing his two-year volunteer term there, he was hired by the Peace Corps as Associate Director of their program in Thailand.

While in the Philippines, he met a Peace Corps staff member, Mary Kinsella. Eventually they married and were sent by the Peace Corps to Samoa with the assignment to start a new Peace Corps program in that country. The first Volunteers in Samoa were nursing, public health, secondary and higher education.

After returning to Minnesota, David headed nonprofit organizations in the areas of mental health, physician licensing, and health care quality improvement.

Mary founded a community newspaper in the Twin Cities, and they worked together before retiring and moving to Clover Springs in 2000. Since then David served a one-year term, 2001-02, as a member of the Sonoma County Civil Grand Jury. He is now in his tenth year as a member of the Cloverdale Planning Commission.

Income continues to exceed expenses and it appears quite likely that we will end the year somewhat in the black.

Our positive budget variance is primarily due to the expenses, which are nearly \$7,000 less than budgeted to date. A part of that has to do with the timing of our bond program, as interest is paid at year-end, and, if there are any redemptions (none last year), those would also be done at that time, so the positive variance at year-end will likely be less than the current one.

Oktoberfest came in with a net income of about \$3,800 vs. the \$5,000 we budgeted. However, last year the raffle was included with Oktoberfest, and this year the raffle will be held in December, so that should help boost our tally.

Positives on the income side have been the first quarter building rental income, and the insurance settlement of nearly \$1,200 that we received from the earlier break-in.

Congregational giving is slightly below budget, but this could be a matter of timing, as this typically picks up during the holiday season.

A very rough preliminary 2012 budget was presented to Council at the November meeting. Only after the full results of the stewardship campaign are known, can this be refined.



Leprechaun Update—Lucky Leprechaun’s \$6,000 Pot of Gold is empty. That’s good news, as it means he was able to meet \$6,000 of increased pledges of our members. Thank you for stepping up to the plate. But, there is more good news. Lucky’s cousin, Lenny, is throwing another \$1,000 into Lucky’s Pot of Gold. So, any new increased pledges, either from those who have already pledged, or are yet to pledge, will also be matched up to that amount.

TRUSTEES' REPORT

Repair of the siding shingles on the south side of Fellowship Hall's exterior has been completed. We give major kudos to Rich Craig for hours and hours of work on the scaffolding to get this accomplished before fall rains set in. Since some of the cedar shingles are still a bit "green", sealant (Penofin or the equivalent) will be applied next spring, after they've had a chance to settle in over the winter. Rich also treated the exterior window trim with a new coat of finish, while Bob Serrano has continue to do touch-up painting of handrails and wooden trim as time and weather permits. Thank you for all the hard work!

Rich Werner and Rich Craig also joined forced to repair some of the lettering on the church's sign in the front lawn. Due to adhesive on some of the plastic letters having "let go", for a time in early October we were the "NITED CHUCH of CLOVER ALE", which was appropriate for Oktoberfest, but now we're back to normal.

We have begun to investigate possible alternatives for our building's insurance coverage (including church liability coverage), as our annual premium will be increasing by \$500 in 2012. No decisions will be made until we have more information. Similarly, we have begun to gather information on costs of rental of other halls and kitchen spaces in the Cloverdale area, to evaluate whether the rental fees for our own facilities might need to be reconsidered or simplified in order to optimize future income from building use.

Lastly, we've taken care of a few repair and maintenance items that have been brought to our attention. The sharp screws that extended from the countertop into the storage cabinets along the north wall of Fellowship Hall have now been removed, fixing a hazard to all who reached inside to bring out dishes, cups, and tablecloths. And, an itsy bitsy spider that had successfully plugged a critical part of the Sunday School's furnace controls has been evicted, so we'll have ample heat for the Sunday School rooms this winter.

ADVENT STUDY SERIES

Ready for ADVENT-ure? Join us for the Advent study series, beginning on Tuesday evening November 29 (7:00-8:30 PM in Fellowship Hall) and continuing weekly through December 20. The series will combine the old and the new, using a contemporary group-oriented methodology called *Contextual Bible Study* for engaging traditional texts in new ways. CBS is described as a "uniquely enabling" process and this is your opportunity to help introduce it to United Church. There are no materials to be purchased.

Contextual Bible Study (CBS) has an interesting history. It was developed out of the need in such places as South Africa, Brazil, and most recently Scotland for a "level playing field" to allow people of widely differing backgrounds and abilities to study together comfortably. The process is simple. Following an opening prayer, a passage of scripture is read slowly and carefully, perhaps more than once, to allow participants to discover more of the details and richness of the text. Beginning with "What jumps off the page at you?", additional questions lead participants into deeper reflection on key ideas, themes and characters, and a sharing of what they know about the historical, religious, or social context of the passage. The focus then shifts to noting resonances between the text and the present experience of group members, and from there to what difference these insights might make in their lives and what individual and group actions they suggest. At each stage, participant's responses are recorded on a flip chart to be revisited and explored further as the study progresses. Key words for this process are "participation" and "exploration", but always at each one's readiness level.

ARE YOUR NEIGHBORS IN NEED ? (NIN)

Obviously, our communities are beset with problems. Just like our church, money's hard to find. People who are down on their luck need help.

What does the United Church of Christ suggest? First, we will share in the Church's (NIN) Neighbors in Need Program. Well, what is that? It is a program where all churches seek donations to help in a huge variety of ways. WHAT IS THE TRANSITIONAL STEERING TEAM (TST)?

The **Transitional Steering Team** is a special leadership group convened to guide an intervention into the life of the congregation for the purpose of renewal and transformation. It works closely with the interim pastor to plan and guide a process that will bring about needed change and prepare the congregation for a new future. The purpose of the TST is:

- To help congregational members heal after the loss of their pastor and to gain perspective on the chapter in their lives that has ended.
- To gather the feelings and ideas of both members and non-members of the congregation about their church in a time of change
- To provide a forum for the sharing and focusing of hopes and aspirations for the future.
- To help the congregation move from preoccupation with the past to a state of readiness for a new chapter in the life under the leadership of a new pastor.

- To involve the congregation in accomplishing the developmental tasks of the interim period.

“Insofar as it is possible, the members of the team should represent a cross section of the congregations’ membership. It is important that the people selected for the transitional steering team have a vision of what can happen during the interim journey of the congregation, because the congregation is in what might be called ‘open space.’ – a time between what was and what will come – and the team is responsible for charting a course that will move the people of the faith community into the future. . .

Transitional steering team members will need to practice what I call ‘appropriate behavior’ during this critical phase of the beginning of the transformation process. They must value each member’s contributions and take suggestions and ideas seriously. They must be willing to listen. They must be willing to become acquainted with resources for gathering and evaluating information. They must honor confidentiality. The trust of the church membership is essential for the team members if they are to be successful in leading a process of change.”

(The above summary is abstracted from an article written by Robert W. Johnson” in the Alban Institute Publication entitled “*Temporary Shepherds.*” The *developmental tasks* to which Johnson refers are those taught by the Interim Ministry Network, namely:

1. Coming to terms with the congregation’s history
2. Discerning the congregation’s purpose and identity
3. Supporting leadership change and development
4. Reaffirming and strengthening denominational links
5. Committing to new leadership and new ministry

Who are the TST and what have they done?

The TST was selected by the congregation, via secret ballot, to ensure that viewpoints sometimes at odds with each other be given fair hearings, and that reconciliations be encouraged, based upon active listening and respectful dialog . The members of the TST are: Lavonne Blucher-Nameny, Tom Clark, Art Jewett, Bill Lambert, Polly Lile, Marilyn Michelin, Bob Timm and Richard Werner.

The TST first met in March and has met monthly for meetings of at least 3 hours each. Through these “healthy conversations,” the TST members have covered a broad range of subjects while developing trust and appreciation for each other, in spite of occasional disagreements. They have been uniquely prepared to take on the challenge of bringing a similar process to the one in which they have been immersed this last half-year out to the wider church, through the cottage groups they are leading. These groups have been formed through a random-selection process. The TST leaders for these particular eight cottage groups were also randomly selected as hosts for each of them. In short, we have trusted in and relied upon the synchronistic outcomes of this random-selection process to optimize opportunities for *everyone* to hear and be heard, not only by those who think/feel alike, but by those who may well have differing perceptions out of which may come greater understandings for all who participate, as is true for the TST itself.

The cottage groups have begun their work, and will meet approximately 4 times a year. One of the main reasons that the cottage groups will not be meeting monthly, like the TST has been doing, is so that the TST leaders can share with each other the insights from their individual groups, at the intervening TST meetings. After this sharing takes place, it should be possible for the TST leaders to decide on which of the developmental tasks to next address (since they are not necessarily sequential), and how best to go about this, so that all the groups are more or less “on the same page.”

A final note: The TST realizes that they have no formal “governing” power within the church polity, which remains as described in the Church by-laws. They do, however, have considerable influence and insights to share with the elected church leadership and the congregation itself, and will hopefully be able to provide significant consultation to the council, boards, and committees as time moves on. (Indeed, most all of the TST members already have elected leadership roles unrelated to the TST, at the current time.)

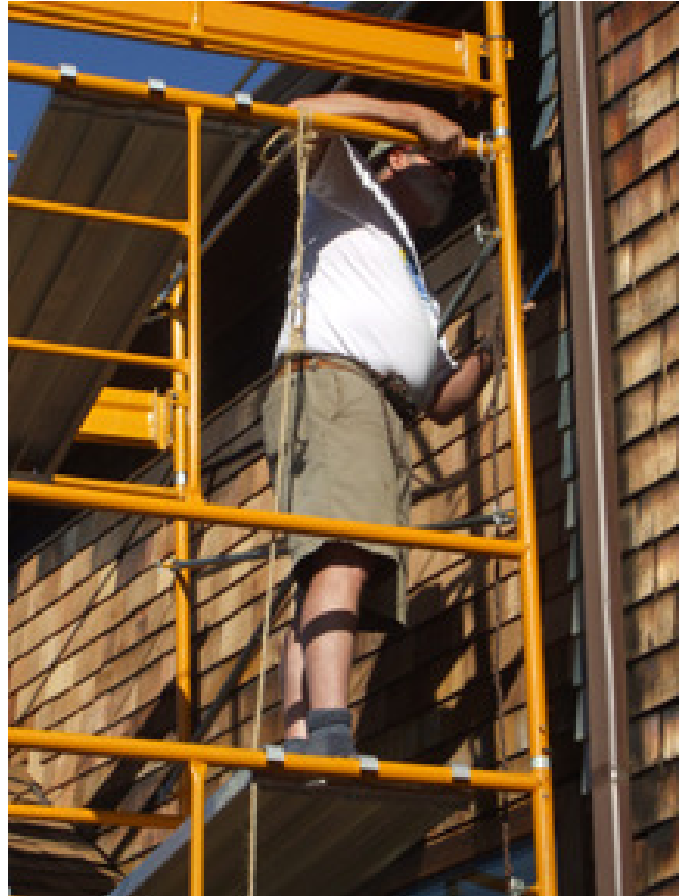
